

## **Ontario Acting on Expert Report for Scarborough and Durham Health Care**

*Greater Investment and Improved Integration for Local Acute Health Care Services*

April 28, 2016 11:00 A.M.

Today, Dr. Eric Hoskins, Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, supported the implementation of recommendations from the [final report of the Scarborough/West Durham Panel](#) related to hospital governance, service delivery and planning to give patients better access to care in the community.

The Central East Local Health Integration Network - a geographic catchment area of local health coordination - serves more than 1.4 million residents, or 11 per cent of Ontario's population. This large community requires expert advice on how to ensure that people get the best acute care possible.

Drawing from extensive community consultations, the expert panel, led by Dr. Barry McLellan, provided recommendations to improve integration and access to hospital services in the Scarborough and West Durham regions.

Starting today, Ontario is taking the next steps:

- Mr. Mark Rochon has been appointed as a special advisor to the Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, and will advance the integration efforts between hospitals in the Scarborough and Durham regions.
- Ontario will be providing capital funding to The Scarborough Hospital to better integrate and expand diagnostic imaging services at the General Campus. This investment will translate to improved services in radiography, fluoroscopy, interventional imaging, cross sectional imaging, CT scanning, ultrasound, breast imaging and nuclear medicine.
- Ontario will also be providing up to \$5 million for a planning grant to develop a Master Plan for each of the Scarborough and Durham region hospitals. This will inform any future major capital redevelopments. This planning grant will also support the redevelopment of the Emergency Department at Rouge Valley Health System Centenary site.

The province also announced a new investment of over \$10 million in local hospitals as part of the 2016 Budget, which includes:

- \$4.5 million in increased operating funds for Rouge Valley Health System

- \$2.9 million in new operating funding for The Scarborough Hospital
- An additional \$2.6 million in operating funding for Lakeridge Health

Improving access to local health care and investing in hospitals is part of the government's plan to build a better Ontario through its Patients First: Action Plan for Health Care, which is providing patients with faster access to the right care; better home and community care; the information they need to live healthy; and a health care system that is sustainable for generations to come.

- In March 2014, a merger between The Scarborough Hospital (TSH) and Rouge Valley Health System (RVHS) did not proceed as had been originally planned.
- In April 2015, the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care announced the creation of the Scarborough/West Durham Panel to develop a plan to address how hospitals in the region could work together to deliver acute services to meet the needs of local residents.

- The Scarborough/West Durham Panel conducted community consultations including focus groups, in-hospital surveys and town hall meetings, which informed its recommendations.
- The expert panel's report builds on previous work developed by Rouge Valley Health System and The Scarborough Hospital, including the [Preferred Integration Plan Final Report \(November 2013\)](#), to identify opportunities to deliver better coordinated and integrated care.

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## **Special Advisor Appointed To Better Integrate Care for The Scarborough-West Durham Region**

Mr. Mark Rochon has been appointed as special advisor to the Minister of Health and Long-Term Care in support of The Scarborough Hospital, Rouge Valley Health System and Lakeridge Health. Mr. Rochon will help to advance integration efforts between these hospital providers, consistent with the Scarborough/West Durham Panel recommendations. His appointment will be for up to 80 days, over a period that will not exceed one year and ending no later than June 30 2017.

Mark Rochon is an Associate in KPMG's Global Healthcare Centre of Excellence. Prior to KPMG, he was President and Chief Executive Officer of Toronto Rehabilitation Institute, which is now part of the University Health Network, starting in 1998. In 2015, he was appointed as a facilitator to work with the Wellington County Hospitals and community to integrate the governance structure of the hospitals. In 2007, he was appointed hospital supervisor for Stevenson Memorial Hospital in Alliston.

Mr. Rochon has more than 25 years of senior level health care experience. He served as the Interim Chief Executive Officer and Interim President of Ontario Hospital Association from January 2012 to June 2012. He served as Chief Executive Officer of the Health Services Restructuring Commission in 1996. Before the Commission, Mark was President and Chief Executive Officer of the former Humber Memorial Hospital, which is now part of Humber River Hospital, for six years. He has also held leadership positions at the Georgetown District Memorial Hospital and Bennett Health Care Centre, as well as the former Clarke Institute of Psychiatry, which is now part of the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health.

He was seconded in 1994 for 15 months as Assistant Deputy Minister of the Institutional Health Group in the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. Mr. Rochon currently serves as a Senior Fellow at the University of Toronto in the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation.

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
