



## **Province Building New Long-Term Care Home in Whitby**

Ontario Renovating More Than 300 Long-Term Care Homes to Improve Comfort and Care

Ontario is investing in long-term care homes to improve the quality of care and comfort for residents.

Today, Parliamentary Assistant John Fraser visited the future site of Glen Hill Terrace in Whitby – a new structure to house up to 160 redeveloped Long-Term Care beds.

This is one of more than 300 long-term care homes that Ontario is helping redevelop over the next nine years. Through these enhancements, residents will benefit from:

- An environment that is comfortable, aesthetically pleasing and as home-like as possible with renewed interior design
- Additional space for specialized programs like rehab and physiotherapy
- More spacious rooms with a maximum of two residents per bedroom
- Better wheelchair access in bedrooms, bathrooms, showers and doorways
- More air-conditioned areas
- Accessible dining areas that provide a home-like atmosphere
- More private work spaces for staff.

Ontario is making the largest investment in public infrastructure in the province's history — about \$160 billion over 12 years, which is supporting 110,000 jobs every year across the province, with projects such as roads, bridges, transit systems, schools and hospitals. In 2015, the province announced support for more than 325 projects that will keep people and goods moving, connect communities and improve quality of life.

Investing in long-term care homes is part of the government's plan to build a better Ontario through its Patients First: Action Plan for Health Care, which provides patients with faster access to the right care; better home and community care; the information they need to live healthy; and a health care system that is sustainable for generations to come.

## **QUICK FACTS**

- Glen Hill Terrace proposes to build a new 160-bed home on 1.8 acres in Whitby. There will be minimal impact to residents, as they will move upon completion of construction of the new home.
- Glen Hill Terrace is also eligible to receive a construction funding subsidy.
- Long-term care homes are places where adults can live and receive help with daily activities
  and access to 24-hour nursing and personal care. They provide more nursing and personal care
  than a retirement home or supportive housing.
- There are about 78,000 residents in Ontario's 630 long-term care homes.
- Since 2003, 10,000 new spaces in long-term care homes have been created and just over 13,500 older long-term care spaces have been renovated.
- The number of nurse practitioners in Ontario's long-term care homes will be increased from 18 to 93 over the next three years.
- As part of the 2016 Budget, Ontario is investing an additional \$10 million in addition to the
  existing \$44 million annual investment in Behavioural Supports Ontario for seniors with cognitive
  impairments who exhibit challenging and complex behaviours.
