

NEW FUNDING FOR CAMPBELLFORD TO CARE FOR SENIORS Program helps patients regain strength after illness and return home

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New funding for the Campbellford Memorial Hospital is on its way to ensure that local seniors, who have been hospitalized for an illness and are getting well, have additional supports to regain their strength and can return home quickly and safely.

An 8 to 10 bed "Assess and Restore" program, to get underway early in the new year, is expected to provide care for up to 200 patients a year and will include specially trained nurses, physiotherapists, social workers and occupational therapists. The program will also be partnered with the local office of the Central East Community Care Access Centre and Community Care Northumberland to ensure that patients are linked to services in the community to support their return home.

Funding of \$262,700 a year was approved by the Board of the Central East LHIN at a recent board meeting and the hospital is now beginning the process of implementing the new program.

QUICK FACTS

- Campbellford Memorial Hospital is a 34-bed Acute Care Hospital
- At the present time the hospital's Alternate Level of Care (ALC) rates range between 30-50%
- This is a measurement of the number of patients who have recovered from their acute illness
 and are now waiting in hospital for placement in a long-term care home or to be discharged
 home with community supports
- The implementation of the new "Assess and Restore" program will ensure that patients are better supported during their hospitalization to regain their strength and return home safely
- One of the goals of the "Assess and Restore" program is to reduce Campbellford's ALC rate to less than 25%
